School Rules and Behaviour Charts

Our simplified school rules are proving to eb very effective. Thanks to the school council, anti-bullying ambassadors and staff for their feedback. The rules are displayed in every classroom and used in our discussions with children to remind them of what we expect:

- Ready to Learn

We are amending our behaviour charts to focus on recognizing behaviour that is positive. New charts will be displayed in all classes after Easter.

Attendance

I won't need to remind you of the sickness challenge we faced together earlier in the term. There are always going to be times when staying at home is absolutely the right thing to do but these should be rare for the overwhelming majority of our children. The expectation remains that children should have at least a 95% attendance rate. Below you can see the clear link between attendance and how well children learn (their attainment). In simple terms, there is a direct relationship between how often you come to school and how well you do. This is why attendance is such a high Trust and school priority.
